Squadding: All matches will be squadded. Squadding for individual matches will be issued during registration. **NRA Membership numbers and classification cards must be exhibited, if a competitor has them, before squadding tickets will be issued.** A competitor who fails to present himself at the proper firing point when his relay is called may lose his right to compete in that event.

Classification: The NRA classification system will be used in all matches. Unclassified competitors will compete in the Master Class. Assigned Classification (Rule 19.6), or Temporary Classification (Rule 19.2), may be used when making an entry in an NRA Regional Tournament, or Mid-Range Prone Regional match. The F-Class is a separate classification in the Mid-Range Prone Regional match. No classification applies to the EIC match however entry preference, if range limits are reached, will be given to non-distinguished competitors.

Targets: Unless noted elsewhere, 200 yards (SR target), 300 yards (SR-3 target), and 600 yards (MR-1 target) for the High Power Regional and Leg matches. 300 yard MR-63, 500 yard MR-65, 600 yard MR-1 targets for the Mid Range Prone, and the F-Class 300, 500 and 600 yard targets for F-Class competitors in the Mid Range Prone. Competitors will be required to pull targets.

Sighters: Sighting shots (Rule 9.2.1), which are allowed in the conditions for each match may be taken and recorded. Sighting shots may be taken in a position other than specified for the match, but must be one of those described in Rule 5 of the High Power Rifle Rule Book, except 5.13.2. No sighting shots are allowed in the EIC match.

Note: 1 – M-110 is allowed as a Service Rifle by the NRA (rule 3.1(d)), but not by the CMP for the EIC Leg Match.

2 - There is also a new rifle division in the High Power Matches, Rule 3.3.2 - NRA Any Sight Match Rifle/Tactical Rifle, which like F-Class in the Prone Matches, only compete with each other's and no one else.

Rules: Current NRA High Power Mid-Range rules will govern. Open Bolt Indicator, Hearing and Eye Protection are required!

Eligibility: Open to any ARC member. One, 2, or 3 day memberships (\$5.00) are available for out of town competitors.

Capacity: Maximum competitors: 60

Fees: Tournament Fee: \$30. (Includes NRA fee of \$9.00) (Shooters under 18 are free)

Entries Due: 07:00 AM – 7:45 AM

Squadding: Squadding assignment for individual matches will be issued during registration.

Classification The NRA Mid-Range classification system will be used. Unclassified competitors will compete in the Master Class. Assigned Classification (Rule 19.6), or Temporary Classification (Rule 19.2), may be used. The F-Class is a separate classification in the Mid-Range Prone Regional match.

Targets: 300 yard MR-63, 500 yard MR-65, 600 yard MR-1 targets for the Mid Range Prone, and the F-Class 300, 500 and 600 yard targets for F-Class competitors in the Mid Range Prone. Competitors will be required to pull targets for other competitors.

Rifles: NRA Match Rifle (Rule 3.3), Service Rifle (Rule 3.1, 3.1.1, 3.1(d) or 3.1.2), Any Rifle/any sight (Rule 3.2) or Palma Rifle (Rule 3.3.3), or F-Class F-TR or Open Rifles.

Match A: Two sighting shots and 20 shots for record in 22 minutes prone slow fire at 300 yards MR-63 target.

Match B: Two sighting shots and 20 shots for record in 22 minutes prone slow fire at 500 yards MR-65 target.

Match C: Two sighting shots and 20 shots for record in 22 minutes prone slow fire at 600 yards MR-1 target.

Match D: The Regional Championship: an aggregate of scores from matches A, B & C.

Classes: NRA Mid-Range Prone Classifications will apply. Classifications in match (D) will be the same as the fired matches.

Awards: Open Awards (Regional Match D)

Winner: NRA Regional Gold Medallion

2nd Place: NRA Regional Silver Medallion

3rd Place: NRA Regional Bronze Medallion

An individual winning an open award (Winner, 2nd, or 3rd), may not win a category/class award in the tournament, but will be counted in determining the number of class awards.

Class and Category Awards

Awards will be issued per the NRA minimum award schedule for registered tournaments. F-Class awards will be separate from Mid-Range Prone. This is not the F-Class Regional, but if there are enough entries there will be awards for them as a category, with classes.

There must be 5 or more entries in a class for one award, 8 or more for two awards; and 13 or more for three awards. If there are fewer than 5 High Masters entered, they must fire for open awards only. The High Master Class may not be combined with the Master Class.

If there is less than the required number of entries in a class to provide awards, they will be combined with the same class in another category, except F-Class. If there are still fewer than 5 entries after combining all categories of a class, there will be **no awards** provided in that class, and all competitors in the lower class will be moved back to their respective category within the next higher class until there is a minimum of 5 competitors in the combined class.

Camp Perry Credits

The National Rifle Association will award five Camp Perry Entry Fee Credit Certificates (\$40.00) to supplement the current Gold, Silver, and Bronze medallions and team award points. The match winner will receive an entry credit. Class winners (other than Match Winner's class) receive an entry credit providing there are five shooters in that class (categories combined) in the aggregate. Other requirements will be posted at the match.

Classification The NRA High-Power classification system will be used. Unclassified competitors will compete in the Master Class. Assigned Classification (Rule 19.6), or Temporary Classification (Rule 19.2), may be used.

Rifles : NRA Match Rifle-Rule 3.3; or Service Rifle-Rule 3.1, 3.1.1, 3.1(d) or 3.1.2. There will be two categories of rifles: NRA Match Rifle and Service Rifle. **There is also a new rifle division, Rule 3.3.2 NRA Any Sight Match Rifle/Tactical Rifle, which like F-Class in the Prone Matches, only compete with each other's and no one else.**

Match 1: 2 sighting shots and 20 shots for record, standing, slow fire, 200 yards, SR target. (Rule 5.12)

Match 2: 2 sighting shots and 20 shots for record, sitting or kneeling, rapid fire, 200 yards, SR target. (Rule 5.8 or 5.10)

Match 3: 2 sighting shots and 20 shots for record, prone, rapid fire, 300 yards, SR-3 target. (Rule 5.6)

Match 4: 2 sighting shots and 20 shots for record, prone, slow fire, 600 yards, MR-1 target. (Rule 5.6)

Match 5: The slow fire aggregate: an aggregate of scores fired in matches 1 and 4

Match 6: The rapid fire aggregate: an aggregate of scores fired in matches 2 and 3

Match 7: The Regional Championship: an aggregate of scores from matches 1-4

Categories and Classes:

In fired match will be the same as aggregate matches.

Awards: Open Awards (Regional Match 7)

Winner: NRA Regional Gold Medallion

2nd Place: NRA Regional Silver Medallion

3rd Place: NRA Regional Bronze Medallion

An individual winning an open award (Winner, 2nd, or 3rd), may not win a category/class award in the tournament, but will be counted in determining the number of class awards.

Class and Category Awards

Awards will be issued per the NRA minimum award schedule for registered tournaments.

There must be 5 or more entries in a class for one award, 8 or more for two awards; and 13 or more for three awards. If there are fewer than 5 High Masters entered, they must fire for open awards only. The High Master Class may not be combined with the Master Class.

If there is less than the required number of entries in a class to provide awards, they will be combined with the same class in another category. If there are still fewer than 5 entries after combining all categories of a class, there will be **no awards** provided in that class, and all competitors in the lower class will be moved back to their respective category within the next higher class until there is a minimum of 5 competitors in the combined class.

Camp Perry Credits

The National Rifle Association will award five Camp Perry Entry Fee Credit Certificates (\$40.00) to supplement the current Gold, Silver, and Bronze medallions and team award points. The match winner will receive an entry credit. Class winners (other than Match Winner's class) receive an entry credit providing there are five shooters in that class (categories combined) in the aggregate. Excellence in Competition Match

Sunday June 12, 2011

Rifles: Firearms in Excellence-in-Competition "Leg" Matches must meet the provisions of Civilian Marksmanship Program Rule 4-11. Inspection will include weighing triggers and visual inspection ensuring the rifle is in compliance with Rule 4-11 of the above mentioned regulation. Arms authorized for use in CMP-approved Service Rifle Matches are as follows:

B(1). U.S. Rifle caliber .30 M1 as issued by the U.S. Army; or a commercial equivalent of the same type and caliber; or either rifle if chambered for 7.62mm X 51mm NATO.

B(2). U.S. Rifle caliber 7.62mm M14 as issued by the U.S. Army; or a commercial equivalent of the same type and caliber.

B(3). U.S. Rifle Caliber 5.56mm M16 (M16A2 or M16A4) as issued by the U.S. Army; or a commercial equivalent of the same type and caliber.

Ammunition: Competitors in Excellence-in-Competition matches are required to furnish their own ammunition. Ammunition used must be similar to that manufactured for and issued through the service components. Specific guidelines are as follows: Ammunition may be commercially manufactured, or handloads. Projectile will be a full metal jacket with a pointed tip. No flat tip or round nose. The projectile may have a "ballistic" hollow point such as that used in the current military M852 style, 7.62mm arsenal match round. These guidelines will apply to all authorized service rifle calibers, i.e., 7.62mm (.308), 5.56mm (.223), and caliber .30 (.30-06). There are no restrictions placed on bullet weight or muzzle velocity. The major item considered to be of paramount importance is safety. All ammunition must be safe to shoot. Remember safety is the responsibility of everyone.

Course of Fire: 10 shots in 10 minutes, standing, slow fire, 200 yards, SR target

10 shots in 60 seconds, sitting or kneeling from standing, rapid fire, 200 yards, SR target

10 shots in 70 seconds, prone from standing, rapid fire, 300 yards, SR-3 target

20 shots in 20 minutes, prone, slow fire, 600 yards, MR-1 target

Note: no sighting shots are allowed at any position or distance.

Affidavit: CMP affidavit and liability agreement completed this year, if required, upon registration for EIC match.

Targets: Competitors will fire or pull targets as squadded.

Awards: First, second and third place.

Leg points awarded according to CMP regulations.

Sunday Team Match

Rifles : NRA Match Rifle-Rule 3.3; or Service Rifle-Rule 3.1, 3.1.1, 3.1(d), 3.1.2.

Course of Fire:

Match 1: 2 sighting shots and 10 shots for record, standing, slow fire, 200 yards, SR target. (Rule 5.12)

Match 2: 2 sighting shots and 10 shots for record, sitting, rapid fire, 200 yards, SR target.

Match 3: 2 sighting shots and 10 shots for record, prone, rapid fire, 300 yards, SR-3 target. (Rule 5.6)

Match 4: 2 sighting shots and 10 shots for record, prone, slow fire, 600 yards, MR-1 target. (Rule 5.6)

Teams: Will be based on a drawing following registration. Each team will have a minimum of one Master / High Master shooter, if available. To promote team equality, officials will be empowered to adjust team composition. This is not applicable if there are other state or national "teams" in attendance, and then there can be an Alaska team without regard to the above.

Awards: First place team members receive equal shares of total team match revenue less expenses.
